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POLITICAL PREFACE

1. The Government of the Republic of Yemen in Sana'a, known as the Salvation Government, remains in its formation, stability and the way it performs its official and effective national depth. It is run institutionally through the various constitutional ministries providing services to more than 20 million Yemenis, representing (80%) of the population of Yemen.
2. This government works effectively despite the political and diplomatic siege it is subjected to. Nevertheless, it managed to weave the threads of communication with the external world, which recently realized that the alleged legitimacy of the Riyadh-based government imposed on the people from outside the borders of the land is nothing but an illusion and can no longer maintain its presence in an inch of Yemeni territory. The so-called legitimate government did not and will never be able to enter into international commitments which are implementable on the ground. It has become obvious that it acts merely as dictated by the countries leading the war on Yemen (Saudi Arabia and the United States).
3. On the contrary, the government of Sana'a has demonstrated its professionalism and proved capability to maintain its full independence from any external influence, including the Iranian influence claimed by the parties involved in the war on Yemen. All the State leaders in their various policies stressed that, although they thank Iran for its principled moral stances in political support for the cause of Yemeni people, this does not mean any dependency or influence on its sovereign decision. The world knows that the war on Yemen was mainly due to its decisive and unwavering decision to restore its independence and sovereignty and defend its interests which have been robbed by the war countries (Saudi Arabia and the United States) for decades.
4. After the recent victory, Yemen will set an inspiring model for all free nations that long for liberation from whatsoever external dependency.

ECONOMIC SITUATION

5. The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) has warned that basic services in Yemen are on the verge of total collapse as the war in Yemen enters its fifth year. This is because of the continuing non-payment of salaries of 1.25 million public sector employees for more than two and a half years after the transfer of the Central Bank of Yemen from the capital Sana'a to Aden. This includes doctors, social workers and other public sector workers. As a result, some vital facilities, such as health facilities, schools, water and sanitation facilities and other basic social services, have been closed or reduced.

6. Within the context of Stockholm understandings of the economic issue, and in view of the situation suffered by Yemeni people as a result of the unjust siege and unfair economic constraints, and the interruption of the public sector employees' salaries, and to remove any claims and justifications that contribute to the continued suffering of the Yemeni people

unrightfully, and to neutralize the economy and everything that affects the lives of citizens and exacerbates the humanitarian crisis, the Supreme Political Council introduced a unilateral initiative directing the government to establish a special account in the branch of the Central Bank of Yemen in Hodeidah governorate and supply the revenues of the three ports (Hodeidah, Ras Issa, Salif) to this special account. The revenues will be used to pay salaries to all Yemenis.

7. Despite the urgent need for petroleum materials and the increasing rate of consumption, the forces of the Saudi-led Coalition of war on Yemen deliberately delay the entry of oil derivatives ships to Hodeidah port in order to tighten the screws on citizens and increase their suffering through inspection in Djibouti and detention at sea for several weeks.


HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

8. The United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator, Mark Lowcock, criticized Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates on Thursday, 18 July 2019, for providing a “modest proportion” of what they promised as a contribution to UN humanitarian efforts in Yemen.
9. Both Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates promised \$750 million at a U.N. fundraising event in February that was seeking \$4 billion, to cover humanitarian aid in Yemen. However, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates have not kept their pledges, according to a briefing by the UN Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs.
10. In his briefing to the UN Security Council on 18 July 2019, Humanitarian Coordinator Mark Lowcock stated, “Those who made the biggest pledges – Yemen’s coalition neighbors – have so far made only a modest percentage of what they promised.” As a result, the organization raised only 34 percent of pledges, compared with 60 percent in the same period last year, the Coordinator clarified.
11. The United Nations Humanitarian Affairs has described the situation in Yemen as the worst humanitarian crisis in the world, where four years of war have claimed tens of thousands of lives and left millions on the brink of starvation.
12. According to international reports, the United States continues to sell military equipment and weapons for billions of dollars to Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, which are leading a war on Yemen.
13. The United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs, Mark Lowcock, admitted in his briefing, on 18 July 2019, to the UN Security Council meeting on Yemen for the first time that the countries of the war alliance have stalled to pay their financial commitments to Yemen. The United Nations has been concealing this, despite the fact that its responsibility is to reveal the main causes that exacerbate the humanitarian situation in Yemen.

VIOLATIONS AND CRIMES

- During the month of July 2019, Saudi-led coalition of war on Yemen continues to target and bombard populated areas in various governorates through its warplanes and armed groups of mercenaries, which led to the destruction of a number of houses, institutions and vital infrastructures that are indispensable for the survival of people. Coalition states and their armed groups have committed massive violations of the provisions of the Swedish agreement that impede the achievement of peace in Yemen.
- The coalition countries keep on imposing illogical restrictions that prevent the entry of ships loaded with the basic materials for the lives of Yemenis, including food, pharmaceuticals and oil and gas derivatives, from entering the port of Hodeidah. There are still more than a dozen ships loaded with oil derivatives at sea.

Civilian Victims during the Month of July 2019






Victim Statistics in the Month of July 2015




Victim Statistics in the Month of July 2016

STORY OF THE MONTH

(My Daughter Died Hungry...!)

The capital City of Sana'a has been bombarded for four years by the Saudi-led coalition of war on Yemen. Grief and darkness were horrendous when one of the coalition aircraft committed a heinous crime. Coalition aircraft bombed a residential neighborhood next to Al-Raei Public school in Sa'wan area of Sana'a city. At the time, a group of schoolgirls were passing by as they left school. Then came the tragedy that afflicted the Yemenis and the free people all over the world. The rocket mercilessly tore the bodies of a number of schoolgirls and turned them into scattered pieces. The view was heart-wrenching, especially when you could see next to their bodies school bags, some pens and notebooks. You could only wonder 'what sort of guilt did these innocent little girls commit'?

Alas! All the international charters and conventions, which have long called for humanity and saving civilians and children from targeting and not to use them as a means of pressure, have been chaotically torn and dispersed in the air with their torn bodies and scattered parts of these little girls. On that awful day, thirteen school girls were massacred and eighty-seven children were wounded. At that gloomy moment, the attendees could hear a distressing tear-jerking voice screaming sorrowfully, "My daughter died hungry!"
